CONGRESSIONAL RECORD ON REPRODUCTIVE FREEDOM 117TH CONGRESS, 2ND SESSION

NARAL Pro-Choice America's 2022 Congressional Record on Reproductive Freedom documents the key House and Senate votes taken on this issue during the second session of the 117th Congress.

In 2022, reproductive freedom was delivered a devastating blow by the U.S. Supreme Court's decision to overturn *Roe v. Wade*, ending the federal constitutional right to abortion as we knew it. While devastating, the Supreme Court's decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* did not come as a surprise—this crisis is the culmination of a decades-long strategy by extremists to undermine reproductive freedom from every angle, including efforts to stack the judiciary with anti-choice judges and influence the Supreme Court and the federal judiciary at large.

The far-right's efforts to shape our judiciary reach far beyond the *Dobbs* decision—as revealed by an explosive *New York Times* report that demonstrated that anti-choice extremists have had unchecked access and undue influence over the Court for years. This investigation demonstrated that the conservative movement is determined to exploit the courts to accomplish what they cannot achieve at the ballot box, as they are unable to garner public support on the merits of their unpopular policies. Anti-choice extremists are undermining our democracy, exploiting the Supreme Court's lack of ethics and transparency in an attempt to further their white supremacist, anti-freedom agenda.

The conservative movement has also chipped away at voters' ability to fully participate in our democracy. This systematic erosion of our voting rights has allowed a minority with a regressive agenda and hostility towards reproductive freedom to block

the will of the majority of Americans. For this reason, in 2022 NARAL updated its endorsement criteria to require that U.S. Senators and candidates for the Senate unequivocally support the freedom to vote and oppose policies—including the filibuster—that stand in the way of voters' freedom to fully participate in our democracy through safe and accessible elections.

The impact of *Dobbs* and the response from Congress and the Biden administration

Following the *Dobbs* ruling, reproductive freedom champions in Congress sprung into action. Both chambers held a number of committee hearings on the impact of the Supreme Court's decision to end the constitutional right to abortion, and champions organized roundtables and press conferences in Washington, D.C., and across the country to highlight the legal consequences and the devastating impact of this ruling on our communities. The U.S. House of Representatives took three votes on bills to protect access to reproductive freedom: the Women's Health Protection Act (WHPA), the Ensuring Access to Abortion Act, and the Right to Contraception Act. The U.S. Senate held two votes to advance WHPA—one following oral arguments in the *Dobbs* case that indicated the Court would likely overturn *Roe v. Wade*, and the other in the aftermath of the leak of a draft majority decision that showed the anti-choice Supreme Court justices' clear intent to overrule *Roe*. In both instances, Republicans blocked the bill's advancement.

Champions in the Senate also took to the floor to seek unanimous consent to pass several bills to protect reproductive freedom—including legislation on the right to travel for abortion care, protections for providers, and increases in funding for family planning programs—yet Senate Republicans stood in the way and prevented every single measure from being adopted. Republicans in the Senate also attempted to reinstate restrictions on Title X, the nation's only dedicated family planning program, and to exclude trans people from federal maternal and child health programs.

In a rare showing of bipartisanship in the last days of the 117th Congress, senators from both sides of the aisle voted

overwhelmingly in favor of amending the end of year omnibus spending bill to include the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act (PWFA), marking a huge win for pregnant people across the country. The Senate also voted down two amendments introduced by Republicans that would have gutted PWFA's protections and emboldened employers to refuse accommodations to pregnant workers. President Biden signed the omnibus package into law at the end of December and the PWFA will take effect in the summer of 2023.

The Biden–Harris administration responded to the Supreme Court's decision to end the constitutional right to abortion by taking swift, concrete actions to protect abortion rights and access. In the immediate months following the decision, the administration issued two executive orders to support people seeking abortion care. The orders addressed several pressing issues, including the right to travel across state lines for abortion care, the ability to access the emergency care pregnant people need, and the creation of the Reproductive Rights Task Force to continue developing ways to respond to this crisis.

Executive agencies across the administration actively sought ways to protect abortion rights and expand access, such as: the Department of Justice litigating against bans and other restrictive actions; the Department of Defense and Department of Veterans Affairs expanding reproductive health access for service members, veterans, and their dependents; and the Department of Health and Human Services issuing a number of reports and guidance to reinforce existing obligations on sexual and reproductive health. Throughout this post-*Dobbs* period, President Biden and Vice President Harris continue to be champions on this issue and frequently use their platforms to advocate for abortion rights and access.

Victories in 2022 and the future of reproductive freedom

Despite the horrifying roll back of our fundamental rights we witnessed in 2022, this year offered moments of hope for the future of our country. Outraged by the Supreme Court's decision to overturn *Roe*, people across the political spectrum

registered to vote in record numbers to reject anti-choice extremism and deliver victories for reproductive freedom across red, blue, and purple states. When given a chance to definitively vote on abortion in state ballot initiatives in Kansas, Kentucky, California, Michigan, Montana, and Vermont, the 8 in 10 Americans who support the legal right to abortion made their values clear by voting in favor of protecting reproductive freedom, including the right to abortion and contraception. While we knew heading into the midterms that we wouldn't win back the constitutional right to abortion in one election, this election proved that the right to abortion has record-high support among voters—and that this issue will remain a priority to Americans for decades to come.

As we end this historic midterm cycle and look to the future, we thank those who have been steadfast leaders in the fight for our fundamental rights, and we look forward to working with new and existing champions to uphold and expand reproductive freedom.

Following the midterm elections, one such longtime reproductive freedom champion, Speaker Nancy Pelosi—the first woman to ever serve as speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives and the Democratic leader for over two decades—announced she would step down from her leadership position in order to make way for a new generation of leaders. From passing the Affordable Care Act to leading the House through an unprecedented abortion rights and access crisis, Speaker Pelosi's legacy is extraordinary. In the upcoming Congress, Rep. Hakeem Jeffries will assume the role of Democratic leader and will be the first Black lawmaker to head a caucus in the U.S. Congress and, along with a new generation of leaders, will help steer our fight to defend and rebuild reproductive freedom.

This year also saw advances when it comes to the federal judiciary. While we are demanding court reform and investigations into the right's influence over the Supreme Court, we are also celebrating historic—and long overdue—firsts on the nation's highest court. Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson was sworn in as the 104th Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of

the United States, becoming the first Black woman to serve on the Supreme Court. Justice Jackson is an experienced, distinguished, and highly-qualified jurist and attorney who spent much of her career working to achieve civil rights and justice. The Biden-Harris administration and Senate Democrats were also successful in moving forward a record number of nominees whose diverse professional and personal experiences will help to protect our fundamental rights in federal courts.

As we look toward 2023 and years to come, we know that our fight is far from over. We'll continue to work to block anti-choice legislation, advance measures to restore and expand abortion rights and access, and fight back against inequality wherever we see it—and that includes attacks on our freedom to vote and our democracy. With a new electorate that's determined to restore abortion rights and access, we have an unparalleled opportunity to continue to make meaningful gains for reproductive freedom.



VOTE DESCRIPTIONS SENATE

- 1. Women's Health Protection Act: Motion to End Debate.** Women's Health Protection Act, H.R.3755. Motion to invoke cloture (end debate) on the motion to proceed to the Women's Health Protection Act, a bill to protect the federal right to abortion and block the barrage of state bans and restrictions on abortion intended to impede or outright deny access. Three-fifths of the Senate (60 votes) is required to invoke cloture on legislation. Cloture motion failed 46-48. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was for cloture. (2/28/22).
- 2. Jackson Nomination: Motion to End Debate.** Motion to invoke cloture (end debate) on the nomination of Ketanji Brown Jackson, a nominee with a positive record on reproductive freedom, to the post of associate justice of the Supreme Court. A simple majority is required to invoke cloture on nominations. Cloture motion passed 53-47. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was for cloture. (4/7/22).
- 3. Jackson Nomination: Confirmation.** Vote to confirm Ketanji Brown Jackson, a nominee with a positive record on reproductive freedom, to the post of associate justice of the Supreme Court. Confirmed 53-47. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was in favor of confirmation. (4/7/22).
- 4. Reinstate Title X Restrictions.** A resolution to express congressional disapproval of the final rule relating to compliance with Title X requirements, S.J.Res.41. Motion to proceed to consideration of the resolution. This measure reverses the Biden administration rule, which overturned the Trump administration's domestic gag rule—an anti-choice policy undermining access to birth control and preventive care that forced comprehensive reproductive health care providers out of the Title X program. Failed 49-49. A pro-choice vote (+) was against the motion to proceed (4/27/22).

5. **Women's Health Protection Act: Motion to End Debate.** Women's Health Protection Act, S.4132. Motion to invoke cloture (end debate) on the motion to proceed to the Women's Health Protection Act, a bill to protect the federal right to abortion and block the barrage of state bans and restrictions on abortion intended to impede or outright deny access. Three-fifths of the Senate (60 votes) is required to invoke cloture on legislation. Cloture motion failed 49-51. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was for cloture. (5/11/22).
6. **Attack on Trans Pregnant People.** Inflation Reduction Act of 2022, H.R.5376. Motion to commit the FY'22 budget reconciliation legislation. Motion to commit the FY'22 budget reconciliation legislation with instructions to add language that would exclude trans pregnant people from maternal and infant-related federal programs. Failed 50-50. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was against the motion. (8/7/22).
7. **Refusal to Comply for Religious Employers: Pregnant Workers Fairness Act.** Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023, H.R.2617. Lankford (R-OK) second-degree amendment to Cassidy (R-LA) amendment to add an exemption that would allow religious employers to deny reasonable accommodations to pregnant working people. Failed 44-53. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was against the amendment. (12/22/22).
8. **Refusal to Comply for State Employers: Pregnant Workers Fairness Act.** Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023, H.R.2617. Braun (R-OK) second-degree amendment to Cassidy (R-LA) amendment to add an exemption that would allow state employers to deny reasonable accommodations to pregnant working people employed by the state. Failed 40-57. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was against the amendment. (12/22/22).
9. **Pregnant Workers Fairness Act.** Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023, H.R.2617. Cassidy (R-LA) amendment to include the Pregnant Workers Fairness Act in the FY'23 omnibus. A bill to eliminate pregnancy discrimination and promote health and economic security by requiring employers to provide reasonable accommodations to working people for limitations arising out of pregnancy, childbirth, and related medical conditions. Passed 73-24. A vote for reproductive freedom (+) was in favor of the amendment. (12/22/22).

VOTE DESCRIPTIONS HOUSE

- 1. Women's Health Protection Act of 2022.** Women's Health Protection Act, H.R. 8296. A bill to protect the federal right to abortion and block the barrage of state bans and restrictions on abortion intended to impede or outright deny access. Passed 219-210. A pro-choice vote (+) was in favor of the bill (7/15/22).
- 2. Ensuring Women's Right to Reproductive Freedom.** Ensuring Women's Right to Reproductive Freedom Act, H.R. 8297. Final Passage. A bill to protect the rights of people who are blocked from accessing care in their state to travel to seek abortion care. Passed 223-205. A pro-choice vote (+) was in favor of the bill (7/15/22).
- 3. Right to Contraception Act.** Right to Contraception Act, H.R. 8373. Final Passage. A bill to protect both an individual's right to use contraception and a health care provider's right to provide contraceptives and related counseling. Passed 228-195. A pro-choice vote (+) was in favor of the bill (7/21/22).
