Subject: Voters in Battleground House Districts Oppose AG Blanche's Plans to Restrict Abortion, Say It Makes Them Less Likely to Vote for Republicans in November

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A new survey from Public Policy Polling in six US House battleground districts - AZ-1, AZ-6, PA-7, PA-8, MI-7, and MI-10 – finds voters strongly oppose newly confirmed Attorney General Todd Blanche's plans to make the *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* Supreme Court decision "permanent in every state." Fully 50% of voters strongly oppose this, another 4% somewhat oppose it. Among independent voters, 64% strongly oppose the plan and another 4% somewhat oppose it.

Voters also oppose Blanche's plans to enforce a 150-year-old law called the Comstock Act to restrict abortion – 59% oppose that, just 24% support it. More voters oppose this than support it across all race, age, and gender subgroups. In particular, a strong majority (71%) of independents oppose Blanche's plans to enforce the Comstock Act, as well as 82% of voters aged 18-45.

There are signs that Republicans in the Senate voting to confirm Blanche as Attorney General could hurt Republicans at the ballot box this fall: 42% of voters say it makes them "much less likely" to vote for Republicans this fall, just 21% say it makes them "much more likely" to vote for them.

PPP interviewed 55 registered voters in six US House battleground districts (AZ-1, AZ-6, PA-7, PA-8, MI-7, and MI-10) on August 10-11, 2026. The margin of error for the poll is +/- 4.2%. 83% of interviews were conducted by text and 17% by landline.
